

Product Designer

What is it?

A product designer is a creative professional who develops and designs new products, ensuring they are functional, user-friendly, and aesthetically appealing. They work on a wide range of products, from everyday consumer goods to high-tech devices, and play a key role in taking a product from concept to production. Product designers must balance creativity with practicality, ensuring that products meet consumer needs, manufacturing requirements, and market demands.

Qualifications/Experience Required:

To become a product designer in the UK, a degree in product design, industrial design, or a related field is usually required. Courses often cover areas such as design theory, materials science, 3D modelling, and manufacturing processes. Practical experience through internships or work placements is highly valuable. Knowledge of design software (e.g., CAD software like SolidWorks or AutoCAD) manufacturing processes are essential.

What the Work Involves:

Researching and analysing market trends, consumer needs, and competitor products to identify opportunities for new designs. Creating initial sketches, concept drawings, and 3D models to visualise product ideas. Developing prototypes and testing them for functionality, usability, and durability. Collaborating with engineers, marketers, and manufacturers to refine designs and ensure they are feasible for production.

Money/Wage Guide:

Entry-level product designers can expect to earn between £20,000 and £30,000 per year. With experience, salaries can rise to £30,000 to £50,000. Senior product designers or design managers may earn £50,000 to £70,000 or more, depending on the industry and company size. Highly experienced designers in top firms or specialised fields can earn upwards of £80,000 annually.
