

Learning Mentor

What is it?

A learning mentor supports students in schools, colleges, or alternative education settings to overcome barriers to learning, improve academic performance, and achieve their full potential. They work closely with students, teachers, and families to provide tailored interventions and guidance.

Qualifications/Experience Required:

You will require a minimum of 5 GCSEs, at least grade 4 (or equivalent) including English and Maths. A Level 2 or Level 3 qualification in Supporting Teaching and Learning, Childcare, or Youth Work can be beneficial. Experience working with young people in schools, youth clubs, or similar settings is often required.

What the Work Involves:

Providing one-to-one support or group sessions to help students address academic, personal, or social challenges. Collaborating with teachers, pastoral staff, and parents to create support plans tailored to individual students. Encouraging students to develop self-confidence, resilience, and study skills. Monitoring and recording students' progress and adjusting strategies as needed.

Organising activities, workshops, or study sessions to enhance learning and personal development.

Future Prospects – Labour Market Information:

The demand for learning mentors is growing as schools focus on providing targeted support for students. Opportunities exist in primary and secondary schools, colleges, and alternative education providers. With experience, learning mentors can progress to pastoral roles, teaching assistant positions, or other education-related careers such as pastoral managers or education welfare officers.

Starting salaries range from £18,000 to £22,000 per year.

Experienced mentors may earn between £22,000 and £30,000, depending on the setting and location.
